


- Foster an environment that is safe, clean and aesthetically attractive;
- Themes of the project serve to navigate throughout the site;
- The Farmer's Market serves as a malleable space that is constantly evolving and creates shared experiences among citizens;
- Connections throughout the site emphasize walkability and bicycling;
- Importance of health with meditative and physical sport spaces;
- Preserves the character of the neighborhood and provides state-of-the-art civic space and architectural design; and
- Proposed buildings are flood- resistant incorporates sustainable design.







Our approach begins with the City of Boulder's Guiding Principles and we have developed a comprehensive approach by using the responses provided by the community and practicing Traditional Neighborhood Design principles by creating a series of themes, including:

- **Ecological Habitats**, by preserving and enhancing Boulder Creek and Farmer's Ditch;
- Outdoor/Recreation with a network of open spaces;
- **Building Projects** that articulates building and transportation uses and parking options; and
- "Transitional Spaces" that serve to stitch the Farmer's Market with the surrounding neighborhoods and nature. The transitional space is constantly evolving every day to create shared experiences amongst visitors.


City of Boulder: Re-imagining A Civic Identity Why Choose Our Design?

What about your proposal is innovative or inspirational?

- The project is articulated by the enhanced environs of Boulder Creek, which we emphasize by Transitional spaces that are constantly evolving to create varied experiences throughout the time of day and year. The transitional spaces stitch the ecological, outdoor/recreation, and land use development themes to develop a community that is compact, connected and diverse and allows a variety of mixed-uses and diversity inclusiveness. All building footprints are removed from the HHZ and a network of open spaces, including the incorporation of bio swales and central greens serve as water retention sites for flood mitigation hazards for long-time Citywide recovery.
- In addition, the City of Boulder had a gross metropolitan product of \$18.3 billion in 2010 and there is an opportunity to attract major employers for collaboration to develop a "smart city" that becomes advanced in technology. Our proposal seeks to develop sustainable strategies such as property tax sharing and the use of solar panels as bonds for feasible funding between public and private entities.

Principle Strategies


- No building footprint in the HHZ zone and flood-controlled buildings in the floodplain zone


- Sculpture and public art navigate citizens throughout the site
